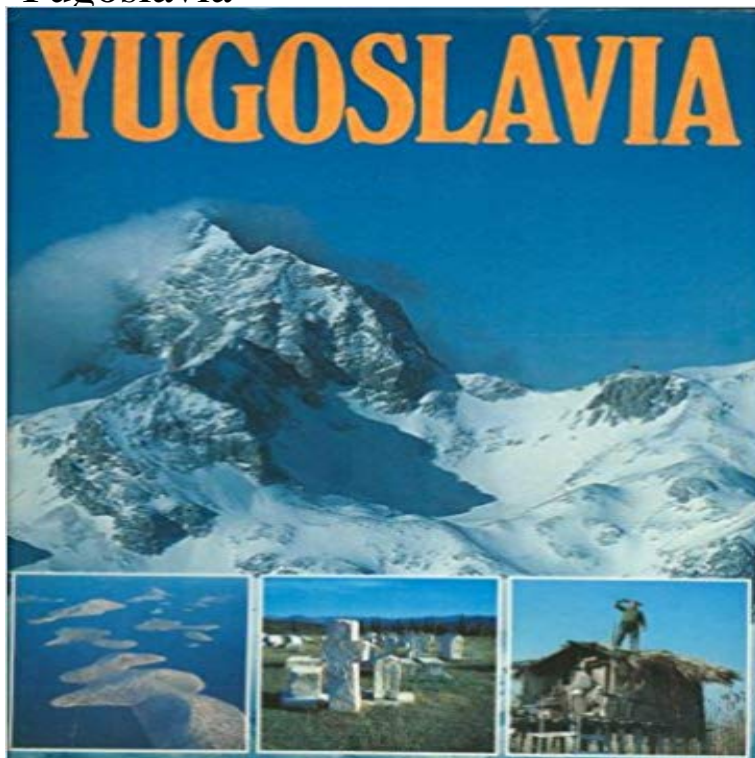


# Yugoslavia
