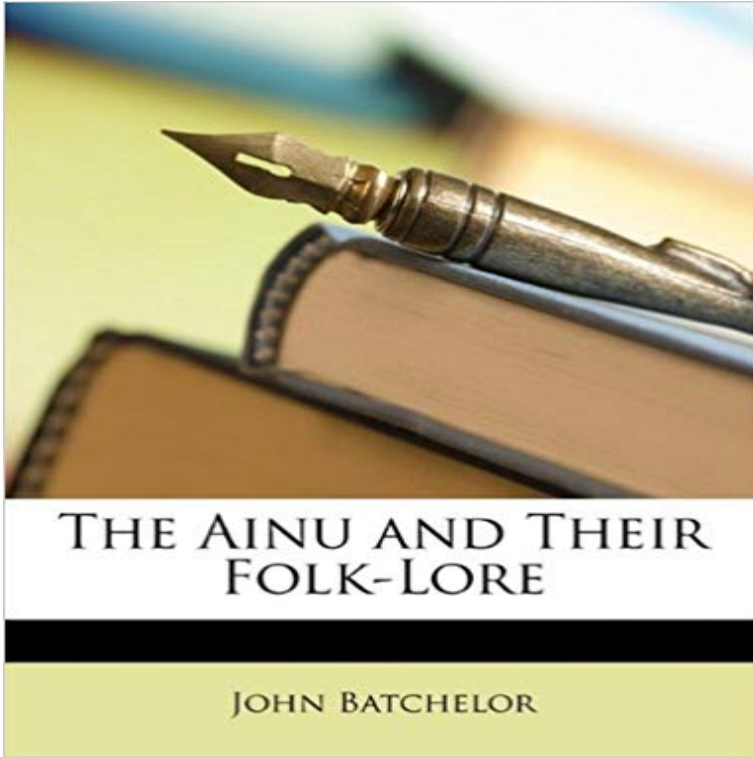


The Ainu and Their Folk-Lore
