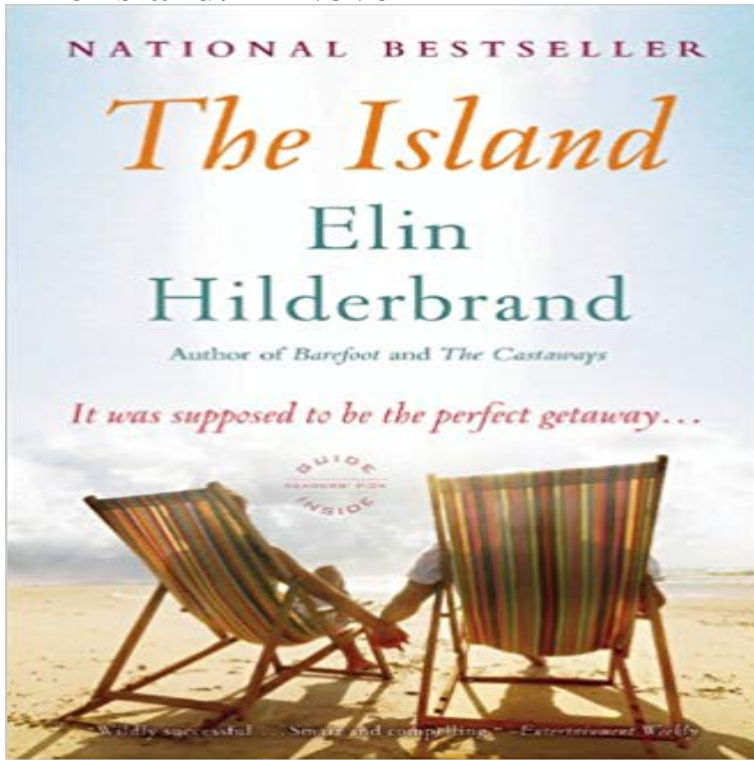


The Island: A Novel
